## Beer and Pub News

Congratulations go to Pauline and Steve at the **Hill Top Belper** on achieving the Cask Marque accreditation for their range of Hardys & Hansons ales. - *Midshiresman*

A visit to the GBG listed **Dead Poets Inn Holbrook** on Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> February found Woodford Wherry 3.8% at £2.20, Abbeydale Absolution 5.3% at £2.40, Lancaster's Blonde 4.5% at £2.20, Shepherd Neame Spitfire 4.5% at £2.30, Taylor's Landlord 4.3% at £2.40 and Leatherbritches Hairy Helmet 4.7% at £2.40 a pint. Additionally being served from the jug was Abbot Ale at £2.40 and Pedigree at £2.35 as well as Weston's Old Rosie Cider 7.3% at £2.60.

On Friday 17<sup>th</sup> February I took a walk down the A6 in **Belper** to call in at the **Tavern**, formerly the Railway Tavern.

The pub is a free house and run by Belper's longest serving landlord William Brady whose previous pubs have included the Cross Keys in Belper and the Hanging Gate at Shottle. One real ale was available in the shape of Marstons Pedigree at £2.30 a pint.

The **Queens Head Little Eaton** is to let (Tenanted), according to Hardys & Hansons website [www.hardysandhansons.plc.uk](http://www.hardysandhansons.plc.uk)

Simon and the team will be holding a "no bells no whistles and no t-Shirts" mini Beer Festival from the 17<sup>th</sup> to the 18<sup>th</sup> of March at the **Queens Head in Belper**.

The list of guest beers includes Exmoor Gold, Taylors Landlord, Robinsons Best Bitter, Bradfield Farmers Stout, Young's Waggle Dance and Marstons Pedigree.

The competition to name "Rural man", the character on the top left of our newsletter, is now closed. The list of entries is being drawn up and will be submitted to Richard Creighton, the head brewer of the **Leadmill Brewery** for him to choose the most appropriate entry. Once selected and the lucky winner will be invited to help brew a commemorative beer by the same name at the recently refurbished Park Hall Brewery. The details will appear in next month's newsletter.

## Doveridge Village Club near Sudbury

Staffordshire on are holding a beer festival from Friday 20<sup>th</sup> to Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> October 2006 which is a 15 barrel event in the village club, membership I am told is not required during the festival period. I was on a Caravan Rally last year and was able to attend and had a great time if you any one is interested to what was on offer I still have the list of beers. - *Nomadic Rex*

The **Red Lion Ripley** had an impressive range of real ales on offer when Half Pint & I called in for lunch on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> February. The regular real ales on offer included Marstons Pedigree, Burton Bitter, Courage Directors, Old Speckled Hen and Theakstons Old Peculiar the guests were Spinning Dog Oat Meal Stout 4.4% at £1.75, Arundel Stronghold 4.7%, Coach House Innkeepers 4.5% and Ironside 9G 4.2% together with Westons Old Rosie Cider 7.3%.

On Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> Feb Half Pint, Jonathan Kriek and I met up with other specially invited guests at Curad HQ (the **Falstaff** on Silverhill Road **Derby**) as part of one of our columnist 55<sup>th</sup> Birthday celebrations.

To commemorate the occasion Jim had brewed a one off special called "Still Very Much Alive at Fifty-Five" a 5.5% a dark rich tasting beer which went down well accompanied by the usual range of Falstaff beers, good music and an excellent buffet of hot and cold food.

On Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> March the **Blue Bell Farnah Green** had Black Sheep Bitter replacing Fullers London Pride from previous week suggesting that the pub now has a rotating guest beer policy. - *Old Horse*

Colin's "Brewery of the Month" for this month at the **Cross Keys Belper** continues with beers from the Mordue Brewery in Tyne & Wear and will include:- Millennium Bridge 3.8%, Geordie Pride 4.2%, Black Midden 4.4%, Workie Ticket 4.5% and IPA 5.1%.

Other forthcoming attractions will be Derby Oberburgermeister 5.2%, Castle Rock Elsie Mo 4.7%, Burton Bridge Top Dog Stout 5.0%, Highwood Lincolnshire Legend 4.2% and Hadrian & Border Centurion 4.5%.

Westons Old Rosie 7.3% and Herefordshire Perry 4.5% are now available on a regular basis with the perry being an incredible £1.80 a pint.

This month sees the trial of a new idea the "Friday Five Pub Crawls" (borrowed from our friends in York Camra) where we meet up in a pub in a chosen location for a pub-crawl of five pre selected pubs in the area.

(We don't necessarily stick to five pubs it's just that it rhymes nicely with Friday).

What better way to visit new pubs and keep up to date with what's happening on the Real Ale scene? The first Friday Five starts in **Milford** on Friday 31<sup>st</sup> March at the recently Cask Marque accredited **New Inn** on Hopping Hill at 7pm we then move onto the **Mill House** for 7.45pm, **Strutt Arms** for 8.15pm, the **King William** for 8.45pm finishing up at the GBG listed **Hollybush** in **Makeney** at 9.15pm. Suggestions for future Friday Fives are welcome.

Word on the street is that the **Miners Welfare** in **South Wingfield** is planning a Beer Festival later in the year. Discussions are at an early stage.

The **Midland Railway Centre** at **Ripley** is planning a couple of Real Ale Trains to celebrate their silver jubilee. Dates are May 6<sup>th</sup> and Sept 2<sup>nd</sup>. No times as yet.

Edward of the Leathbritches Fenny Bentley fame was spotted serving behind the bar of the **Green Man** in **Ashbourne** on Shrove Tuesday. On offer were Up'ards Ale, a 5.2% IPA (my beer of the year so far) and a 4.0% Down'ards Ashbourne style Ale. For the confused reader, Ashbourne hosts the centuries old "Royal Shrovetide" football match between Ashbournians born on the Up'ards side of the River Henmore and those born on the Down'ard side of the river. These 2 Ales were brewed especially for this year's battle. - *Wheatcroft Wanderer*

## Ripley Round up

Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> February

The **Prince of Wales** had Marstons Pedigree £2.20, very good. Also Shepherd Neame Spitfire available.

Friday 4<sup>th</sup> February 2006

The **Hippodrome** had one real ale on offer in the shape of Courage Directors 4.8%.

We were treated to a look in the old cinema, which still has the screen and projection room, but alas, not all of the seats were in place.

A two minute walk found us at GBG listed **Pear Tree** where Kimberley Bitter, Kimberley Mild 3.5% at £1.90, Olde Trip and seasonal guest Fatal Distraction 4.5% were all available.

From here we set off on a 10-minute walk past the hospital enroute to the **Woodman** on Maple Avenue, another H&H pub, with Kimberley Bitter and Kimberley Mild at £1.99 a pint.

There must have been some sort of celebration going on because there was a large buffet set up in the corner.

Next we walked down Norman Road to the **Horse & Jockey** on Cromford Road, which on my last visit had at least three real ales on, however tonight we had to make do with Marstons Pedigree 4.5% at £2.20 a pint and a loud Karaoke session.

Undeterred we pressed on to the **Red Lion** the spoons pub which by this time was about 9.30 pm and the place was absolutely packed out. Another disappointment as it had only Abbot and Herold Swartzbier 5.2% at £1.76.

From here we crossed the road to the **Three Horse Shoes** where the music was booming and a pair of door technicians on the door who insisted I remove my hat on the way in for security reasons?

One real ale was on offer Deuchars IPA at £2.26 a pint, which was served to us by the bar staff who were all wearing schoolgirl uniforms. -*Billy & Jed*

The list of beers for the **Grapes Beer Festival** in **Belper** which runs from the 23<sup>rd</sup> to the 25<sup>th</sup> of March is as follows: - Jennings Golden Host 4.3%, Adnams Explorer 4.3%, Archers Crystal Clear 5.0%, St Austell Tribute 4.2%, Highgate Beezone 3.8%, Tom Woods Old Timber 4.5%, Springhead Charlie's Angel 4.5%, York Yorkshire Terrier 4.2%, Deuchars IPA 3.8% and Hop Back Odyssey 4.0%. Regular beers on the bar will be Marstons Pedigree and Burton Ale plus one other guest. There will also be Irish music on the Friday and Saturday nights.

The **Old Crown** at Cavendish Bridge **Shardlow** is holding a Beer Festival on Friday evening the 24<sup>th</sup> and all day Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> March with approx 15 beers some from Highgate, Highwood, St Austell, Hopback, Caledonian, Springhead, Archers & York among others; Music & Burger Bar also Available.

Whilst out walking from Matlock on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> of March JB called in at the **Miners Standard** in **Winster** to find regular Marstons Pedigree and sample a refreshing pint Flowers IPA at £2.18.

The **Talbot Hotel** on Bridge Foot **Belper** had regular Pedigree and guest Hydes HPA 4.5% at £2.40 a pint available on the 11<sup>th</sup> of February.

Some interesting beers have been appearing on Friday and Saturday nights at the GBG listed **White Post** at **Stanley Common**; a selection of those noted recently includes Lancaster Flamin Nora 4.8%, Derby Heritage 5.1%, Falstaff 12<sup>th</sup> Night 6.5%, Great Oakley Tailshaker 5.0%, Falstaff Step to the Right 6.5%, Milestone IPA 4.0%, Tower Gone for a Burton 4.6% and Falstaff Oh Mummy 10.0%.

On Friday 10<sup>th</sup> of February Del Boy & I accompanied Steady Steve on a visit to **West Bridgeford Hockey Clubs Beer Festival**. The winter beers were Arundel Chillli Willi 4.6%, Atlas Blizzard 4.7%, Brakspear Brass Monkey 4.0%, Cotliagh Snowy 5.0%, Dent Frosty Weather 4.5%, Mauldon Mid-Winter Gold 4.5%, Oakham Black Hole Porter 5.5%, Phoenix Snowbound 4.3%, Titanic Iceberg 4.1% & Young's Winter Warmer 5.0%. There were also 3 Summer beers (a notice said "for those dreaming of steamy summer days chasing chickens.....?"), these were Hopback Summer Lightning 5.0%, RCH Steam Sale 4.5% & Roosters Leghorn 4.3%. Between the three of us we managed to try all except the Hopback and Steady Steve once again managed to pick the runt (Brass Monkey). Good beer and a nice friendly atmosphere. -*Rodders*

## Down Under with Me Owd Conker

I took a visit to the "Victorian Microbreweries Beer Festival" at Federation Square in **Melbourne** yesterday 8<sup>th</sup> February. 54 beers from 16 microbreweries were available from around the state of Victoria. Not quite at the scale we're used to but nevertheless it's a good start. Entrance was \$20 (about £8.50), which included 20 beer samples (1 sample was 65ml, so 20 x 65ml = 1.3liter, about 2.5 pints).

Friday 24<sup>th</sup> Feb decided to try **Matlock** for a change. Started from the train station about one o'clock with a good climb to the **Sycamore**. On offer, Black Sheep 3.8%, Adnam's Bitter 3.7% and Draught Bass 4.4%. More climbing, then the **Thorn tree** with Adnam's and Black Sheep again, TT Landlord 4.3% and Everards Tiger 4.2%. Didn't try the **Duke of Wellington**, but the usual H&H array was visible through the window. Down now to the **Gate** No real ale, but pumps on the bar ready, and should be starting a couple soon, probably including Pedigree. Next the **Horseshoe**, offering Wells Bombardier 4.3% and a very peculiar Old Peculiar 5.6% - not quite off, but definitely not on. Next door(ish) the **Red Lion** had Courage Director's 4.8% and Peak Ales Bitter 4.2%, the best pint so far. Finally, the **Crown** had the usual abundance, including Spitfire 4.5% and Abbot 5.0%. A change, but no real excitement. -*Midshiresman*

Did some serious wandering last month.

Stumbled into South Africa's only Micro Brewery in **Cape Town**. Down on the superb Victoria and Albert Docks is **Michells Brewery**. They have a dark beer, Raven. Imagine a good home brewers attempt at Theakstons Old Peculiar and you're there. Bosun Bitter at 3.8% is good & John Smiths-ish, their lager, called 'Draught' at 5% is an excellent thirst quencher in the hot climate. And for the head bangers, a 7% 'milk & honey' ale. I'll give you honey but no milky tastes. A pint and a half costs £1:90!!!- *Wheatcroft Wanderer*

On Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> January I travelled by train up to West Yorkshire to meet the Gentle Giant for a tour of the Good Beer Guide pubs in **Wakefield**. We had arranged to meet up at **Henry Boons** on Westgate which is about 5 minutes walking from Wakefield Westgate station. The GG had arrived some time before me and had introduced himself to Gareth the Landlord who was very obliging offering the chance to sample the beers before buying them.

My last recorded visit to this pub was in February 1985 so I was well overdue another visit. Four real ales were on offer including regulars Clark's Classic Blond 3.9% and Taylors Landlord with Clark's Rams Revenge 4.6%, Wakey Wakey 4.4% £2.12 as the guests.

We then proceeded to systematically knock off the rest of the pubs in the GBG including the National Inventory listed **Redoubt Inn** on Horbury Road.

The Showman's IPA 5.3%, which appeared in mid February, is set to be the first in the range of Showman's beers and will include a Mild, Bitter, Stout and Gold.

Showman's Gold 4.4% is set to make its debut later this month at the Leicester Beer Festival.

The traditional pale copper coloured bitter to be brewed for the St Georges day parade in Ilkeston is to be called. Pride of Ilson 4.0%.

Funfair beers could soon be appearing on a regular basis at the Wellington on Bennets Hill Birmingham.

Following requests for the popular seasonal Christmas Cakewalk 6.5% Dave has brewed a slightly lower gravity version at 6.0% called Cakewalk which will become one of the "core range" of beers.

## Del & Rod's Real Ale Rambles

On Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> February we started our walk from Holymoorside, which isn't far from Chesterfield and made our way to Cutthorpe, on the way Del Boy got the mother of all bootys (in fact it was more like a leggy, I was surprised his boot was still on when he got out). We passed the **Royal Oak** at **Brampton** and the 2005 GBG listed **Gate Inn** (now the Gate Inn Restaurant) at **Cutthorpe**, we've been in both and consider neither worth a re-visit instead we decided on the spur of the moment to call in the **Peacock** at Cutthorpe. This is a pub we've walked past a time or two and after this visit I now know why! Though it did have Wells Bombardier 4.3% & Greene King Abbot Ale 5.0% on hand pull it's too much of an eatery for our liking. We carried on through Cutthorpe and just after the **Three Merry Lads** (another eatery) we headed towards Old Brampton via Linacre Reservoirs. At **Old Brampton** we came out at the church, the clock face has got 63 minutes on it ?? (I counted them), and headed straight across the road to the GBG listed **George & Dragon** on Main Road, a Sign outside said "Muddy boots welcome" Del Boy hoped muddy trousers where welcome too. Three real ales were available Adnams Bitter 3.7%, Marstons Pedigree 4.5% & Skinners Best Bitter 3.8% (and we saw the pump clip this time) the other guest beer had gone and was going to be replaced with Jennings Cumberland 4.0%. This is a wonderfully friendly pub and is well worth a visit, the only thing missing was a roaring fire to help dry Del Boys trouser leg. There is a beer festival on the 19<sup>th</sup> May.

Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> of February saw us start our walk from Oxton in Nottinghamshire, this is new territory for us and I had to buy a map of the area which cost me £7.49....robbing gits. We headed off up Windmill Hill and passed Loath Hill, which apparently affords one of the best views in the county (on a clear day you can see parts of Derbyshire, Leicestershire & Lincolnshire, on a foggy day you can see bugger all), and joined the Robin Hood Way which took us on it's meandering and undulating way to the village of **Halam** and the GBG listed **Waggon & Horses** on The Turnpike. At this Thwaite's eatery muddy boots

are definitely not welcome so we donned our boot bags and entered to find Thwaite's Original 3.6%, Thoroughbred 4.0% & Lancaster Bomber 4.4% and all except one of the tables set for dining. Del tried the Thoroughbred and I tried the Bomber (in corresponding glasses) both were in good order but at £2.50 a pint we thought a tad overpriced but there were bowls of pigs nipples on the bar. From there it was a short walk to **Edingley** where we called in the **Old Reindeer** on Main Street (which for some insane reason has got a Red Deer on the pub sign) and had a choice from Mansfield Cask 3.9%, Cameron's Creamy 3.6% & Strongarm 4.0%, Marstons Sweet Chariot 4.8% & Red Brick Double Barrel 4.3%. Having not heard of Red Brick and the landlord couldn't shed any light on it either, we gave it a whirl and it was ok but not worth £2.50 a pint....maybe it's the going rate in these parts. We then got on to the Southwell Trail which lead us to **Farnsfield** and the GBG listed **Red Lion** on Main Street where we had a choice from Marstons Pedigree 4.5%, Mansfield Cask & Jennings Cocker Hoop 4.6% which we tried and didn't think much to. On the way back we stopped for a bite at a memorial that marked the site where Halifax Bomber MZ519 LK-U of 578 squadron crashed in 1944 after returning from a raid on a V1 site at Croixdelle. All crew members, who were aged between 20 and 24, were killed....it makes £2.50 a pint seem so trivial.

On Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> of February we started our walk from the car park at Middleton Top near Wirksworth. We walked a short way along the High Peak Trail before cutting down towards Carsington Reservoir then making our way up the other side via Callow & Moorside to **Kirk Ireton** and the magnificent **Barley Mow**. If you haven't been in this GBG & NI listed pub WHY NOT???? It is an absolute classic where all the beers, which on our visit were Burton Bridge Damson Porter 4.5%, Hartington IPA 4.5%, Cottage Ernie Ales 4.5%, Storm Silk of Amnesia 4.7% & Hook Norton Old Hooky 4.6% all priced between £2.05 & £2.20, are served straight from the barrel as nature intended and always in good order. There was also Thatcher's Cider at £1.80 but the most reassuring thing was that the lager was the most expensive drink at £2.50...there's one in the eye for the fizz drinkers. Del Boy found a small ball in the road so we amused ourselves by kicking it all the way down Wapentake Lane and Dark Lane 'til we got fed up. It did try to snow on several occasions but failed miserably we hoped it was saving itself for our trip to the Lake District next week.-*Rodders*

## The Ex Adman Column

This month, we visit Lancashire and the **Black Horse at Preston**, a true classic in every sense of the word. The pub can be found on Friargate, in the town's main shopping area, and is only a few minutes walk from Preston Railway Station. Grade II listed, the pub consists of 4 rooms connected by a corridor. On entering from Friargate the two rooms on either side of the corridor, featuring pictures of old Preston, are well worth seeing but it is further back, in the heart of the pub, where the true riches are to be found. To the right of the main servery is a magnificent ceramic bar in cream and light green, and beautifully tiled floor and walls. The room on the left has a timber counter base and sash windows containing Art Nouveau glass. Deeper into the pub there is an alcove with fixed seating, and abundant coloured glass design. The Black Horse is, deservedly, a recipient of an English Heritage/CAMRA pub refurbishment award. It is a Robinson's pub, a regular in the Good Beer Guide and one of only three Lancashire pubs in the National Inventory. If you are intending to visit this classic pub, and it is more than worth it, the telephone number is 01772 252093 if you need to check the opening hours.
