Of the 6 ales available 3 were nationals - Black Sheep, GK Old Golden Hen & Abbot, the others were more interesting. I had a taste of Theakston Lightfoot, which I had not seen before but indulged in Abbeydale Snowdrift and Wall's Keeper's Gold, the latter being particularly good. With a real fire and friendly atmosphere is worth visiting if in the area"

The Railway Tavern at Langley Mill is now a freehouse and no longer tied to Alcazar Brewery. The plan is to stock local ales with Dancing Duck 22 and Dark Drake featuring recently

Del & Rod's Real Ale Rambles

On the surprisingly dry morning of Sunday 7th we started our walk from Kegworth from where we took a somewhat circuitous route (and hearing our first skylark of the year) to Lockington - where we found a log for our morning coffee - before continuing on through Hemington to **Castle Donington**. Our first port of call was the **Apiary**, a pleasant bistro bar with **Pedi** and **Blue Monkey Infinity** on hand pump, of which the latter was favoured. A few doors further down the road we came to the **GBG Chequered Flag**, a rather plush micro pub, and were treated to **Blue Monkey Bg Sips**, **Charnwood Old School**, **Derventio Barbarian**, **Dancing Duck Flag Ale**, **Burton Bridge Draught Burton Ale**, and a beer from **Froth Blowers** with the **Flag Ale** and **Old School** being in good order. Continuing down the road we called in the **Castle** (formerly the **Moir**, I think) where we were surprised to find **Wells Glorious English**, **Directors**, **Sharps Atlantic**, **Home Ales Robin Hood** and **Charnwood Vixen** on hand pump. We went for the latter, which wasn't particularly to our taste. The plan was to walk up to the **Nags Head** but **WhatPub** states that it is closed on Sundays, which we thought most odd, so we made our way to the **Airport** path, which took us most of the way back to **Kegworth** for a 9.5 miler

Got the 1.20 train down to **St Pancras** and on to **Dover** but couldn't resist bailing out at **Faversham** and just yards from the station, the **Elephant**. Just a couple of halves, **Canterbury Azzaca Rye 5%** and **Madcap Anglo American Pale 4.8%**, then down to the **Dover Winter Ales Festival** for the umpteenth year. If you don't like strong beer it's probably not for you, nowt under 5%! Sampled **Ballards Pagoda Power 8.5%**, **Cairngorm Santa's Sledge Hammer 5.8%**, **Fyne Ragnarok 7.4%**, **Kissingate Powder Blue Blueberry 5%** and **Mordue Pandazilla 7%**. Now round the corner to the **Rack of Ale** micro pub for **Three B's Bees Knees 3.7%** and **Westerham 1965 4.8%**. Another short walk to the **Lanes** micro pub for **Madcap Redhead 3.9%** and **Canterbury Wife of Bath Ales 3.9%**. And so to bed. Saturday, after a latish breakfast, back to the festival, which opens at 10.30. Incidentally it's the same weekend as **Chesterfield**, but free to **CAMRA** members! **Hop Studio Mocaya 5.9%**, **Caveman**

Cavedweller 5.8%, **Goachers Old Ale 1066 6.7%**, **Ramsgate Upperhop 5%** and **Black Pearl 6.2%**, **Old Dairy Snow Top 6%**, **Wantsum Ravening Wolf 5.9%** and **Portly Pig 5.5%** and **Rockin' Robin Portly Robin 5%** sampled. Now a 5 minute walk to see my mate at the **Mash Tun** micro pub but got chatting and forgot to make a note of the beers! I was going to the match at **Ramsgate** but it was a 12.45 kick off but still went up to do some pubs. 4 crackers in the **Great Tree** - **Mad Cat Redhead** and **Farmer Jim's Perry 5%**, the **Montefiore Arms** (**Gadds tap**) - **Seasider 4.3%** and **Stout**, lovely at 4.6%, the **Artillery Arms** - **Dark Star Hophead 3.8%** and **Wantsum Ravening Wolf**, finishing off in the **Conqueror Ale House** micro pub, missed the **Hovelling Boat** as time was running out! Just back home for **MOTD**. A note for anyone interested in doing **Ramsgate** there is a loop bus right outside the station for all pubs every 7 minutes or so - **HH**

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For my annual foray into **Nottingham** with work colleagues I took the **Red Arrow** bus on Friday 5th Feb. After finishing work which is near **Canning Circus** at 4-00pm I thought I would try the **Portland Arms** as I had never been in but it had closed down. So on to the **Organ Grinder** where the **Blue Monkey** beer was not especially good and the welcome less so, I had to ask for my drink to be topped up. Fortunately the next stop at the **Falcon** was infinitely more impressive with a friendly welcome from the barmaid who also kept the cellar and had been a brewer. The beer range was very good and I had **Caythorpe Dover Beck** which was a new brewery for me and enjoyable. Also available were **Nottingham Sooty Stout & EPA**, **Oakham Inferno**, **Black Iris Snake Eyes** and **Abbeyle Jester** of which I was given a taster. Look forward to returning to this hospitable local. Next door was the **Sir John Borlase Warren** which was also excellent with 6 ales from **Lincoln Green**, **Everards Tiger** and curiously 4 from **Colchester**. Again a good welcome, this place also offering an extensive food menu and impressive décor

with an open fire so again well worth a visit - there are so many ales you could stay here all night! Moving down **Derby Road** towards the city I came across **A Room With A Brew** which is the tap for **Scribblers** brewery and had only opened earlier in the day. It was fairly busy as expected and had 4 **Scribblers** beers on the bar along with **Shardlow Rev Eaton**, **Raw Brown Cow**, **Springhead Roaring Meg** and a rare appearance of **Titan Pale** outside **Derby**. I had a couple of the **Scribblers** but now needed to meet up with some colleagues so made my way to the **Malt Cross** just off the **Market Square**. I had the house beer from **Brewsters** which was good with **Bluestone Rockhopper**, **Black Iris Stab** in the **Back**, **Navigation Charles Henry Strange IPA** and **Adnams Ghost Ship** the alternatives. After this it was **Guinness** in the **NRA** sports bar with colleagues then 'beer' in the **Indian** restaurant before the bus back to **Derby**. Unfortunately the **Red Arrow** arrives just as my next bus departs so with 25 minutes to kill I tried the **Brewery Tap** where the beer was ok but the clientele was almost entirely students. To finish off I took an absolute soaking walking back for the bus home - **Chris P Duck**

RuRAD Supporting Local Beer Festivals

At the end of January I called into the **Talbot Tap** in **Ripley** to take a look at their dark ales mini beer festival. Beers available included **Barnes Wallis**, **Almond Dark**, **Winter Ruby**, **Imperial Stout**, **Original Stout** and **Revolution** - all from **Amber Ales**, alongside **Honey porter** from **Burton Bridge** and **Bramble Stout** from **Milestone**, with **Angry Bird** from **Magpie** and **Sloe Porter 7.0%** from **Amber** in reserve in the cellar. A good selection for dark beer lovers. I settled for the **Imperial IPA**, which was also in the cellar - **Charisma**

On the morning of January 30th I met up with **Trigger**, **Cassandra**, **HTC**, **Scarface**, **Chris P Duck** and **The Old Fruit** at **Derby Train station** for the 10.40 to **Nottingham** from where we got the 11.29 **Lincoln** train and alighted at **Newark** for the **Beermuda Triangle Beer Festival**. Our first stop was the **GBG Just Beer**, which, as in previous years, had by far the best selection with offerings from **Alechemy/Beavertown**, **Belleville**, **Bexley**, **Brass Castle/Ossett**, **Magic Rock**, **Manning**, **Parker**, **Red Star**, **Summer Wine**, **Totally**

Brewed, Tweed, Yorkshire Dales, Track, Neepsend and Pig & Porter, with Bexley Redhouse and Parker Saxon Red going down very well. Next it was on to the **GBG Prince Rupert** where there were 6 beers on hand pump and another 6 on a stillage, I had one from the stillage but I can't remember what, which is a shame because it was really nice. We retraced our step to the **Flying Circus** and found 8 beers on hand pump from the likes of Magic Rock, Brass Castle, Newark, Theakston, Hophead and Tiny Rebel and Bass on Gravity. I went for Newark Norweigan Blue, which was ok. It was at this point that we left The Old Fruit with her wine and newspaper and continued on to the **GBG Organ Grinder** to find 5 or 6 Blue Monkey beers on hand pump plus another 6 or 7 straight out the pin in a little back room of which I went for Magpie Pica Porter, which was very nice. We also bumped into Bluestreak and The Chair with his better half, which was even nicer! Our next stop was the **GBG Oscars Inn**, which wasn't partaking in the festival but had beers from Salopian, Tom Wood, Thornbridge, Oldershaw and Cottage alongside a house beer, of which I went for the Tom Wood Brass Monkey. Back on the Beermuda trail our next stop was the **Fox & Crown** where I completely forgot to make a note of the beers but there must have been about 8 on hand pump plus another 6 or so on a separate stillage of which I had Green Jack Lurcher Stout, which was top notch. Next it was on to the **GBG Vaults** where there were about 7 or 8 beers on offer with the Siren Craft Caribbean Chocolate Cake at 7.4 % being a superb drink. The original plan was to go down to the Castle Barge, but whilst in the Fox & Crown a very rare thing happened, CPD came up with a good suggestion! Having picked up a Newark Ale Trail leaflet he pointed out that the **Ram** had multiple hand pumps and might be worth a visit, so visit we did.....and disappointed we weren't. 8 hand pumps dispensed beers from Newark (4), Walls, Cathedral Heights, Fullers and a real cider. I went for Newark Best Bitter and Walls Northallerton Dark and both were in fine form. We also bumped into The Chair and his good lady again. The **Castle Barge** was our final port of call where there were offerings from Woodfordes, St Austell, Full Mash, Wadsworth, Charnwood, Titanic and Adnams, of which I went for Full Mash Manhaton Pale and Wadsworth Swordfish and both were in good order. Then it was off for

the train back to **Derby** where some of us partook in the **Brunswick** before heading home - Ed

On the way back from a hectic weekend in Leeds, which I hope you can read about next month, Bald Eagle and myself called in to the **Chesterfield Arms** 7th anniversary beer festival in **Chesterfield**, only to be told that it had finished the previous day, the Saturday. However we were pleased to see a full selection of 22 beers still available in two locations - the main bar and the barn bar. Bald Eagle sampled the Darkness from Loch Ness and Off the Rails from Offbeat brewery while I settled for West Coast from 360 Degrees brewery. There were also beers from Salopian, Ashover, Ramsbury, Roosters, Harviestoun, Thornbridge, Mordue, Tiny Rebel, Flying Monk and the list goes on! A very impressive selection, including several beers on gravity in the barn - was well worth calling into on the way back from Leeds on Sunday February 14th - Charisma

Stayed at **Burgh-le-Marsh**, which is about 5 miles inland from Skegness. This village is now cut off from the main A158 road but still has 5 pubs. Our accommodation was in a small cottage behind the **Bell Hotel**, which had a decent bar area also serving excellent food with an Italian connection. Owned by Bateman's, it has had a major refurb and whilst there the beers were XB & Rosey Nosey which were both very good throughout the week and served by the friendly landlord and staff in a convivial atmosphere. We intend to return in a better season as it is good flat cycling to take in some country pubs. Whilst in the village we also visited 3 of the 4 other pubs, the **Burgh** was not used due to its alleged imminent closure and demolition for housing. The **Red Lion** was a decent local boozer with the Rocking Rudolf ok but GK IPA not sampled. The **Fleece** was excellent for food and to my surprise the GK Speckled Hen (not a favourite of mine) was the best I can ever recall but again the GK IPA was not tasted (as usual). Good place but

only if having a meal. The **White Hart** was like the Marie Celeste with no patrons and nobody serving at the bar but eventually I had an ok XB, which was the sole choice. The eventual server was the pub owner covering for his daughter who was away, so I hope she is more welcoming than him or this could be the next pub to close. On the first full day there we visited the **Vine Hotel** in **Skegness** after concluding a walk at Gibraltar Point during which the car was broken into. This is very much a posh hotel but the small snug bar is quite relaxing with Bateman's ales including my choice XXXB, which was good, also XB & Rosey Nosey. Christmas Eve saw us visit **Horncastle** where I was able to visit **Old Nick's**, which is the tap for Horncastle Brewery. Their Lucifer's Desire, Lilith's Lust, Wicked Blonde & Balthaza's Baubles were all good so well worth it with a friendly welcome to boot. On Christmas Day the weather was vile so no chance for walking plus an insecure vehicle provided the opportunity to try another new brewery early afternoon. This time it was Leila Cottage Brewery with their ales featuring in their tap, the **GBG Countryman** at **Ingoldmells**. Their Lazy Days 3.6, Ace Ale 3.8 & Leila's One-Off 5.1 were all in good order but with driving a problem I raced back to the **Bell** for a couple more before exhausted landlord Rob closed the bar for a well-earned Christmas meal. Boxing Day found us in **Wainfleet** where there are now only 2 from 7 pubs left despite the proximity to Bateman's Brewery and apparently one of these is likely to close early 2016. The good news is that Bateman's are sprucing up the décor and food offering in all of their best pubs, albeit at the loss of some failing pubs. The **Woolpack** has changed enormously into a trendy bar with a food orientation but still had good ales with XB, XXXB & Gold on offer. The last day saw us move on for a single night in **Louth**. We decided to eat first so a quick stop at the Wetherspoons **GBG Joseph Paxton** where I chose Black Horse Bitter which was not too good over a couple of Milestone & the usual Spoons regulars. Moving on to the **GBG Wheatshaf**, this proved to be an old pub with a moderate range of ales including Tom Woods Topsy Toad, Titanic Plum Porter, Bass and London Pride. The **GBG Brown Cow** was oppressively hot with the beer range not too exciting - Oldershaws Yuletide, Black Sheep, Harvest Pale, Directors and London Pride. The oldest pub The Whyte Swan was closed and up

for sale. We were recommended to visit the **Woolpack** but the effects of the open mic karaoke were almost life threatening although the beer was ok with Adnams Shingle Shells, Batemans XB & Gold. By far the best pub was the **GBG Gaslight Lounge**, the home of Fulstow Brewery. I had just enough time to sample their Marsh Mild, Common, Northway IPA, Pride of Fulstow & Xmas Spice which were all good before retiring to the B&B. On the way home we called at

Cleethorpes where I was able to make a first visit to the **No 1 Pub** on the railway station. The beer was excellent and served by a very enthusiastic manager of a friendly place. Charnwood Three Kings was a strange selection with other beers from Fulstow, Horncastle, Bass and Black Sheep. I also managed a return visit to the adjacent **No 2 Pub** where the bar manager remembered me from my previous visit but not sure if this

was complimentary. The Old Fruit was not impressed by the language of the Grimsby & Lincoln football supporters present after the local derby match. The interesting beers were York Snowflake, Hancocks HB and Rudgate Ruby Mild; unsurprisingly I was not tempted by Doombor or 3 from GK. Overall not a great area for a range of real ale but the Bateman's pubs are usually decent, otherwise microbrewery taps are the best option-Chris P Duck
